The program planned to target children at risk for abuse or neglect and provide parenting classes at no cost to rural families.</li> </ul>

New grantees will be required to implement a program evaluation.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Funded programs must provide a 25% community match the first and second years, a 40% match the third and fourth years, and an 80% match the fifth year.</li> <li>▪ The lead agency is the designated body for all grant monies devoted to children and family issues. This assures a coordinated distribution of various funds and ensures a statewide network of programs devoted to the same goals as the CBCAP programs.</li> <li>▪ The state plans to combine funds from diverse sources for RFPs issued in FFY05.</li> </ul>
PEER REVIEW	PARENT LEADERSHIP	LINKAGES WITH OTHER SYSTEMS (CHILD WELFARE, PSSF, ETC.)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ A Peer Review Committee meets once every three months (minimum) to oversee the evaluation of all areas of programming provided by grantees of the Kansas Social Rehabilitation Services/Children and Family</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Kansas has created a state-level Parent Advisory Group, and grantees are required to recruit two parents to participate in the group. Participating parents are reimbursed for mileage, lost wages, child care, transportation, meals, and lodging.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The CBCAP lead agency is the Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund of Kansas, which includes the Secretary of Health and Environment, the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, the Commissioner of</li> </ul>

<p>Policy (SRS/CFP) and the Kansas Children's Trust Fund.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Committee members include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Consumers of services</li> <li>• Service providers</li> <li>• Local planning council members</li> <li>• Business and community leaders</li> <li>• Representatives of the Governor's Advisory Committee on Children and Families</li> </ul> </li> <li>▪ Each program receives a peer review site visit at least once a year.</li> <li>▪ Site visit review teams consist of a Peer Review Committee member and/or SRS Area Office representative, a representative of another grantee located in the same general area, and a community representative who is not a member of the collaborative.</li> <li>▪ Reviewed grantees complete the following forms for review by the site visit review team: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Peer Review Questionnaire</li> <li>• Consumer Satisfaction Survey</li> <li>• Collaborator Questionnaire</li> <li>• Relationships with the Community survey</li> </ul> </li> <li>▪ The review team reviews the completed materials and the grantee's quarterly reports, interviews program representatives, and shares the results of the peer review with the Peer Review Committee.</li> <li>▪ The Committee uses reports to identify technical assistance needs and develop recommendations for the grantee.</li> <li>▪ The grantee has 30 days to develop an action plan in response to the Committee's recommendations.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Advisory group members are responsible for: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Participating in needs assessment and quality improvement processes</li> <li>• Participating in focus groups, conferences, trainings, and meetings</li> <li>• Serving as mentors to other parents</li> <li>• Serving on nonprofit boards of directors</li> <li>• Reviewing written and audiovisual materials</li> <li>• Assist with fundraising</li> <li>• Reviewing grants</li> <li>• Organizing events</li> <li>• Serving as program evaluators, co-trainers, group facilitators, members of hiring committees, and witnesses at hearings</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<p>Education, a Justice of the Supreme Court, and the Commissioner of the Juvenile Justice Authority, as well as legislative and gubernatorial appointees. The Trust Fund is responsible for all grant monies devoted to children and family issues, which ensures some linkages across systems.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Kansas has developed a common grant application that combines past application packets for CBCAP grants and for grants from the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Both types of grantees are required to participate in the same peer review process.</li> </ul>

- **Fatherhood:** Several grantees are developing fatherhood initiatives.
  - **Training:** Some grantees provided training and education on child abuse issues to other professionals (school personnel, early childhood educators, etc.)
